8:30-9:35 Bob Perry: The Alchemy of Native Plants; Source of Life and Sustainability

Sustainability is often a very general concept. Specific guidelines and criteria are needed to provide a basis for design concepts and the uses of energy and materials in landscaping. This presentation covers several important quantitative guidelines and criteria, including a profile of the basic life-sustaining functions of plants with an emphasis on native plants. The talk will cover applying the principles and concepts of natural ecosystems and plant communities to contemporary landscape design for the purpose of achieving increased levels of sustainability.

Bob Perry, landscape architect and Professor Emeritus from California State Polytechnic University at Pomona, California, is a recognized expert in areas of landscape plants and water conserving garden design. Over the years he has combined his academic career with writing and professional practice with the study and appreciation of native plants. Bob has recently written and published *Landscape Plants for California Gardens*, a comprehensive color illustrated planting reference for professionals and serious gardeners alike.

David Magney: Use of Trees Native to Southern California 10:55-12:00 in the Landscape

Many people do not know what trees are native to our area, or which ones are appropriate for use in the landscape. Native trees, if appropriately placed, are adapted to our climate, provide habitat, and generally require little supplemental irrigation. There are 59 trees (including large shrubs that can be small trees) native to southern California. Brief descriptions of many of these will be provided, including photographs, with discussions on most of them. The appropriate placement and basic site conditions required will be shown.

David L. Magney is a botanist and Certified Arborist knowledgeable in the flora of California. With over 35 years of experience, he formed his own company (David Magney Environmental Consulting) in 1997 after working for other firms for 15 years. He earned a B.A. in Geography and Environmental Studies (emphasis in Botany) from UCSB and an A.S. in Landscape Horticulture from Ventura College. He is currently completing research on the flora of Ventura County.

John Greenlee: Native Grasses in Meadow Gardens 1:30-2:35

The time has come for America to lose the lawn. We can create gardens that are more sustainable AND more beautiful. Native plants thrive in our unique local conditions and provide habitat to our wildlife, making them excellent choices as key garden components. Mr. Greenlee will discuss native California grasses and the flowering plants and bulbs that combine well with grasses to create ecologically sound and beautiful meadow gardens.

John Greenlee is a horticulturalist and garden designer specializing in meadows and grass ecologies and is author of *The American Meadow Garden*. As an expert in grass ecology and a champion of sustainable design, he has created meadows all around the world. He founded Greenlee Nursery, the oldest specialty grass nursery on the West Coast. His designs are featured at the San Diego Zoo in Southern California, Disney's Animal Kingdom in Florida, and in private residences from California to Morocco and Saudi Arabia.
